Eau Claire native to open Phil Vassar show Sunday at The State Theatre

au Claire native Jim Hoehn will be the first to say he's not the best singer, and he's not the best guitarist.

What he really loves to do is write, and telling his stories comes out, in one form, as music.

Since he won a songwriting contest and made his first public appearance at Milwaukee's Sum-merfest in the early 1990s, Hoehn has been fortunate to open performances for American songwriters such as Rodney Crowell, Jerry Jeff Walker, Don Williams, Mac McAnally and many others through the years.

"If I'm on stage with a guitar, it's the only way I have of get-ting my writing across," Hoehn, currently living in Seattle, said. "People seem to like them, and it gets me out of the house.

On Sunday, he'll be returning to Eau Claire to open for country music singer Phil Vassar, whom Hoehn has had the pleasure of opening for in the past.

Hoehn describes his own writing as Americana folk music, which fits Vassar's deep country

He has released four records and one greatest hits album.

He expects he'll play several of his original songs, some of which touch on topics an Eau Claire audience will recognize, such as a song about a local rock band that formed in the 1960s called The Thundermen, of which his oldest cousin was the original lead

That local connection is still what he enjoys most and why he's looking forward to playing at The State once more.

"Whenever I have played at The State Theatre, there has not been a time where I have not known 10 to 12 people in the au-dience," he said. "They'll come up and ask questions. When you get a response to your writing, it's kind of fulfilling."

He describes his music as "a really fun part-time job." He has several new songs in the works and is hoping to put out at least one more album.

In the meantime, though, he stays busy. Hoehn is a journalist by trade, currently working in the Seattle Times newsroom as a web editor.

He also is a freelance sports writer, mostly covering professional and major college sports. When he travels to perform for his music, he said he often contacts media to see if he can slip in covering a game in whatever city he's playing in.
"I work hard, do the best I can

and ultimately just enjoy writ-ing," Hoehn said. "I like being busy and writing is something I can do well.'
